Japan-Australia exchange through rugby: Speech by Ambassador Sumio Kusaka on the ocassion of the reception to send-off the University-Norths Owls for the 2017 Japan Tour

Ladies and gentlemen

Good evening and welcome to my residence. It is an honour to welcome the representatives and sponsors from the University Norths Owls and the ACT Brumbies, as well as members of ACT Government, Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade, Department of Health, and Japan-related friendship groups. My wife Ikuko and I are very pleased to have you join us this evening to celebrate the occasion of the University Norths Owls' journey to Japan.

In fact, Brumbies head coach, Mr Stephen Larkham who is present today also played in the Japanese team called, Ricoh Black Rams from 2009 to 2011. Stephen was hailed as a hero

when he helped troubled Black Rams to get back in to the Japanese top league in just one year! Stephen is not only a legend in Australia but he has captivated many Japanese rugby fans and young players with his brilliant plays.

Australia is one of the best Rugby nations and Japan has a lot to learn from Australian players.

As Ambassador, I would like to promote more active exchange between Japan and Australia, especially in the field of sport. It is very important for young people to widen their views and see what is out there to learn from different people and cultures. I imagine for most of the Uni Norths players, this will be their first overseas trip and I hope you learn a lot from your trip to Japan. Tenri University and Tokai University are traditionally very strong teams and they are looking forward to playing in friendly matches with you.

I sincerely wish that you will return with many fond memories and aspirations to keep playing rugby in order to play for Australia in 2019 World Cup in Tokyo!
