Dear friends,

As some of you may already know, last week, Japan, Australia and the United States held the Trilateral Strategic Dialogue on the occasion of the ASEAN Foreign Minister's Meeting in Manila, Philippines. It was the 7<sup>th</sup> meeting of its kind and was attended by the Foreign Minister of Japan, Taro Kono who has taken his post recently, Minister for Foreign Affairs of Australia, Julie Bishop and U.S. Secretary of State, Rex Tillerson. A Joint Statement was released after the meeting and I have attached a copy for your information. (<u>Text of the Joint Statement</u>)





In this dialogue the chairman, US Secretary of State Rex Tillerson, and foreign minister Bishop showed unity for regular Japan-US-Australia talks and deep collaboration. They also noted the extremely meaningful discussions that were held. Immediately after the TSD, foreign minister Kono also said that he was very happy to have attended the event. The three cabinet ministers exchanged opinions on the region's various tasks concerning North Korea, the South China Sea, the East China Sea and countering violent extremism measures. In addition, the ministers also reached an agreement where Japan, the US and Australia will cooperate and work closely on tasks that develop from now and into the future.

The Ministers condemned in the strongest terms North Korea's unlawful pursuit of a nuclear weapons program and unprecedented ballistic missile activity since last year, including the launches of intercontinental ballistic missiles on July 4 and July 28, 2017. The Ministers also

urged ASEAN member states to maximize pressure on North Korea.

With regards to North Korea in this dialogue, foreign minister Kono said that North Korea

has become a threat to the region and international community. He added that in order to

further increase the pressure on North Korea a collaborative strong message based on strong

deterrence and strong sanctions is needed. The three cabinet ministers committed to

continue to work closely together. Foreign minister Kono stated that a solution to the

adduction problem is one of significant importance for Japan. Foreign minister Kono

received support and understanding from both America and Australia for his efforts on this

matter.

The Ministers expressed serious concerns over maritime disputes in the South China Sea.

Furthermore, the Ministers urged ASEAN member states and China to fully and effectively

implement the 2002 Declaration on the Conduct of Parties in the South China Sea.

The Ministers welcomed the development of trilateral cooperation on capacity building for

maritime security and safety in Southeast Asia.

This dialogue was the first meeting between Foreign minister Kono and Foreign minister

Bishop. Building on this meeting both foreign ministers will tackle various tasks in the

region and the international community through future bilateral meetings as well as various

other opportunities by exchanging frank opinions, holding discussions and further building

on their trusting relationship. To this end, I will work hard whilst collaborating with my

Australian government counterparts.
