Good evening. I would first like to express my sincere gratitude to the ACT Government, Chief Minister Barr, the Canberra Nara Sister City Committee, the SES, volunteers and everyone involved in making this event possible, as well as welcome you all here this evening.

I would also like to congratulate Chief Minister Barr on his successful return to the Chief Ministership at the recent ACT Legislative Assembly Election.

Speaking of which, this year marks the 40th year anniversary of the signing of the Basic Treaty for Friendship and Co-operation between Japan and Australia.
