When I meet MEXT alumni from her time at the Embassy, they fondly recall her generosity and professionalism.

Indeed this was like a human Google; An endless supply of answers.

This involved looking for venues, sourcing artists, and putting together invitation lists for events.

I assume diplomats then, must have been impressed by her extensive network of people in the community to make these events a success.

With an abundance of knowledge, skill, and experience, she was an invaluable asset.

Diplomats may come and go, but it is the role of locally engaged staff to ensure the foundation of the Embassy's activities remain solid and strong.

She also served as a committee member for the Australia-Japan Society.

She joined the committee in 1997, and served for more than twenty years and became an integral part of AJS.

She organised countless activities for members, new and old.

One of the most adored events was the East Meets West charity concert.

I had the pleasure of hosting it last year, and immensely enjoyed the beautiful performance by my friend, GOTO Aiko of the ACO in an intimate setting in this residence.

On a lighter note, many of you know that Ms Prior is synonymous with golf.

Of course, I do not mean to say she was in the same boat with those ambassadors who are busy playing golf and hardly working.

In fact, her love for the sport has brought together our two countries in the much-loved Australia-Japan Goodwill Golf Tournament.

She successfully got sponsors onboard with many prizes to attract participants.

One must have very good negotiation skills to secure such sponsorship.

We could run through more events that she organised, but finally I want to highlight her contributions in supporting the Tohoku Youth Program.

Fundraising is a challenging task, but that did not stop hardworking Eriko-san in raising money each year.

She also volunteered as an interpreter for the participants and ensured everyone had a pleasant stay in Canberra.

I can imagine the comfort the children felt knowing she was around to help them during their stay in an unfamiliar environment.

These are just some of the examples of her contributions through the Embassy and in AJS, and ultimately her contribution to the friendship enjoyed by Japan and Australia.

With her kindness, reliability, selflessness, and positivity, she is the go-to person: someone who never says no.

She is highly regarded within the community and this award recognises her longstanding efforts in and outside of the Embassy.

And so it is with deep gratitude that on behalf of the Government of Japan, the Order of the Sacred Treasure, Silver Rays is hereby awarded to Ms Eriko Prior.
